Cape May's African American Heritage



9:30AM: Underground Railroad Trolley Tour

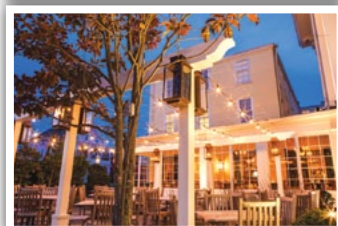
Few people know the part that Cape May played in the Underground Railroad. Nor do many know about Harriet Tubman's presence here in the early 1850s. Join our guide on a trolley tour of the places where escaped slaves sought refuge and continued their journeys to freedom. Hear the stories and visit some of the places connected with the Underground Railroad, including: a tour through the Owen Coachman house; a walk in a historic cemetery where our earliest free Black settlers are buried; and a glimpse of the summer home of Stephen Smith, a leading businessman, abolitionist and unsung hero of the Underground Railroad. Learn how Harriet Tubman earned money to fund her work in Cape May.

1:30PM: Cape May's African American History Lecture

Center for Community Arts presents a PowerPoint tour of Cape May's once-thriving African American business community. Until the 1970s, about 60 businesses were Black-owned: restaurants, boarding houses and hotels, auto mechanics and more. Your group will learn about the long history of African Americans in Cape May County as well as about the prominent leaders of the community and distinguished visitors.



2:30PM: Congress Hall Hotel Tour

Congress Hall has created the perfect way to learn about this seaside resort's 200-year history: a living history tour led by none other than "Annie Knight," who owned the hotel from 1904 to 1931. The tour features a 45-minute walking tour through the halls, basement and lawn of the grand hotel.



3:15PM: Free Time on the Washington Street Mall

Visit downtown Cape May and spend some time walking the beautiful Victorian streets, shopping at the Washington Street Mall or just strolling the beachfront.
